WHY DO WE NEED THE LAW



► There have been 15 terror attacks in the UK since 2017.

► There is a need to improve security and ensure robust, proportionate, and consistent measures are in place at public venues to make sure public security is improved.

IT DOS MHAT MITT



It will introduce a "Protect Duty"

 Terrorism (Protection of Premises) Bill.

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The law will require those responsible for certain premises and events to consider the threat from terrorism and implement appropriate and proportionate mitigation measures.

IT WOKKS

"The "responsible person" is the person who has control of the premises, usually the owner or the operator.



APPLY TOS MHO MITT MHO MITT



► The proposals will apply to premises which are accessible to the public, are used primarily for entertainment and leisure, retail, food and drink, museums and galleries, sports grounds, Government buildings, visitor attractions, places of worship and education establishments.

APPLY TOS WHO MILL



To be caught by the legislation the premises must have a public capacity greater than 100 individuals. Premises covered include buildings and permanent outdoor premises which have a physical boundary.

APPLY TOS WHO MILL WHO MILL



The Bill will also make provision for events e.g. festivals, which have a public capacity of over 800 or more individuals and where access to the event is by express permission e.g. payment or ticketed event.

IT WOKKS



► The Bill will impose requirements on premises and events to increase their preparedness for and protection from a terrorist attack by requiring them to take proportionate steps depending on the size and nature of the activities that take place there.

IT WORK?

The Bill will establish a tiered model, linked to the activity that take place at the event or premises and its capacity.



HOW WILL

A standard tier that applies to qualifying premises with a maximum capacity of 100 or more individuals e.g. larger retail stores, bars or restaurants.



IT WORKS HOW WILL



In this case responsible persons will have to undertake "easy and simple activities" e.g. completion of a plan to ensure better preparedness, free training, awareness raising and making sure staff are fully informed.

IT WORKS



For standard premises a "standard terrorism evaluation" will have to be completed and reviewed every 12 months or when there is a change to the premises.

A copy of the evaluation must be made available to each individual who uses the premises as a place of work.

IT WOKKS



Enhanced tier requirements apply to premises or events with a capacity of 800 or more individuals. In this case a risk assessment and security plan to a "reasonably practical standard" will be required. WHEN WILL INTO FORCE?
